LeadingAge Oregon comments on Nursing Facility Capacity Reduction Initiative

LeadingAge Oregon has submitted comments on the Nursing Facility Capacity Reduction Initiative, which is one of Adult and People with Disabilities' <u>Strategic Funding Proposals</u> for the 2013-2015 biennium. The initiative is comprehensive and includes downsizing nursing home bed capacity through a proposed enhanced rate, a modified Certificate of Need process, and the elimination of current exemptions from the provider tax. In addition to commenting on and requesting data for many of the assumptions in the initiative, we request that the initiative be considered within the broader system discussion that will take place during the 2013-2015 biennium, rather than as a stand-alone effort. STATE NEWS

New Food Sanitation rules delayed

Oregon's Food Sanitation Rules and adoption of the 2009 FDA Food Code, which were due to be implemented July 1, have been delayed. According to Dave Martin, Foodborne Illness Prevention Program Coordinator, the delay will allow current inspection software to be adapted to allow food service facilities to be inspected using the new code and rules. In addition, some food service providers are lobbying strenuously against the new prohibition on bare hand contact with ready-to-eat food. DHS staff have confirmed that nursing facility, assisted living and residential care surveyors will not begin surveying to the new rules until DHS receives word that the updated code has been officially adopted. In the meantime, fact sheets on each of the significant rule changes are available on the state Food Code webpage.

In-Home Care Agencies must comply with new rules by October 1

The newly revised In-Home Care Agency rules are now in effect, but providers have until October 1 to come into compliance with the new rule provisions. In the meantime, the state has distributed a <u>fact</u> <u>sheet</u> on the rules as well as an <u>evaluation tool</u> for clients who self-administer medications. We also have posted the <u>final rules</u> and the new <u>In-Home Care Agency classification table</u> on the LeadingAge Oregon website. The Health Care Regulation and Quality Improvement program of the Public Health Division, which oversees in-home care agencies, is soliciting questions on the new rules, and plans to answer those questions in a Q&A document that it hopes to distribute quarterly. Reminder - ALF/RCF Rule Comments Due July 23

If you have any comments on the revised ALF/RCF rules, be sure to submit your comments to DHS by July 23. The new rules:

- Clarify rules related to resident displacement due to remodeling or renovation;
- Require facilities to implement a policy for referral of residents who may be victims of acute sexual assault to the nearest trained sexual assault examiner;
- Clarify the evaluation of smoking addressed in service plans;
- Update facility building requirements to current building codes and regulations;
- Clarify the rules related to voluntary closures, ownership issues, required postings, use of resident funds, and evaluation of alcohol and drugs use addressed in service plans.

Survey trends in ALFs, RCFs and nursing facilities remain consistent

The most recent survey trend report for ALFs, RCFs and nursing facilities for the first quarter of 2012 didn't include any surprises, with the most frequently cited tags very similar to past reports. For nursing facilities, the top tags were F-tags 309 (highest practicable well-being), 323 (free of accident hazards) and 272 (comprehensive assessments). For ALFs and RCFs, the most frequent tags were 260 (general service plan), 270 (change of condition and monitoring), and 280 (resident health services). The average number of citations per survey held steady for nursing homes at 3.8, but dropped to 5.1 in community-based care, compared to 9.6 in the previous quarter. Review the survey trend report.

Eight CCOs certified to begin serving clients August 1

The state has certified the first eight Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs) to begin serving local communities in Oregon beginning August 1. The CCOs will provide care for Oregonians enrolled in the Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid). This is the first wave of certification; additional CCOs are expected to be certified and begin providing services later in the year. Read more about the newly certified CCOs.

The Community-based Care Team at DHS has once again re-assigned policy analysts, due to Jan Karlen accepting a new position with Aging and Physical Disabilities focusing on dementia care. August 16 MOVE program to examine challenges facing LGBT older adults

MOVE (Making Oregon Vital for Elders), Oregon's culture change coalition, is sponsoring an educational program on August 16 entitled "Gay and Grey: Understanding Challenges Facing LGBT Older Adults." Participants in the program, targeted to senior living and care providers, will examine the special needs, characteristics and concerns of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) individuals as they age. <u>View the flier</u>.

NATIONAL NEWS

LeadingAge Oregon urges flexibility in HCBS waiver rules

LeadingAge Oregon has submitted comments to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) encouraging the agency to revise proposed rule revisions for the Home and Community-based Services (HCBS) waiver to allow states like Oregon to continue to develop innovative home and community-based service programs for seniors. Some of the proposed rule changes specify in greater detail where HCBS services can be provided, which would lead to the unintended consequence of making it difficult for Oregon HCBS providers to continue to qualify. <u>Read the LeadingAge Oregon</u> comments.

HUD clarifies owner responsibilities related to lifetime sex offenders

HUD has issued a notice that strengthens language relating to the responsibilities of owners and agents to ensure that no lifetime registered sex offenders are admitted into federally assisted housing. The notice also states that if an owner discovers that a registered sex offender was admitted after June 25, 2011, the owner must immediately pursue eviction or termination of assistance. <u>Access HUD notice 2012-11.</u>

HUD Option 4 rent adjustment changes won't take effect until October

LeadingAge has clarified with HUD that the Rent Comparability Study requirement for Option 4 budget-based rent adjustment requests will not be effective until 150 days after the release of the page changes (around mid-October). Colleen Bloom of LeadingAge reports that HUD is expected to release FAQs soon related to the Section 8 guidebook page changes.

FASB moving forward with accounting changes for refundable CCRC entrance fees

The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) is moving forward with its proposed changes to accounting for refundable entrance fees. The changes are expected to have an impact on a significant number of CCRCs across the country that have been amortizing refundable entrance fees to income. Read more about the changes.

CMS conducting quality improvement research in nursing homes

Nursing homes are being advised to check their Quality Improvement and Evaluation System (QIES) mailbox (where MDS data is submitted) to determine if they have been selected to participate in a data collection project on quality improvement being conducted by CMS. The research project is an outcome of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) mandate that CMS establish standards related to Quality Assurance and Performance Improvement (QAPI) in nursing homes. Beginning this summer, the Nursing Home Quality Improvement Questionnaire will be disseminated to 4,200 randomly selected nursing homes.

LeadingAge Oregon CCO data workgroup formed

Several LeadingAge Oregon member met in June to continue our discussion about how members can best work together to position themselves for successful partnerships with coordinated care/accountable care organizations (CCOs/ACOs). Participants at the meeting agreed that they would

like to work together to select and/or develop standardized data collection tools that members could use to track rehospitalization rates and other key data. A workgroup was formed to review available tools and make recommendations.
