# CCO picture to become a bit clearer in the next weeks

With the state of Oregon now accepting applications for Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs) to serve Medicaid clients, we will begin to gain a clearer picture of what groups are interested in acting in this capacity. Letters of intent to form a CCO are due April 2, and the state plans to post the letters online the following week. In addition, every CCO applicant will be required to hold a public meeting sometime between early April and mid-May. CCOs are local health entities that will deliver health care and coverage for Medicaid clients, replacing a fragmented system of physical, behavioral and other types of care. Although long-term care is not included in the CCO reimbursement system, CCOs will be required to coordinate care with long-term care providers.

# CMS to allow nursing home waivers for Life Safety Code culture change provisions

CMS has announced that it will permit nursing homes to immediately take advantage of four provisions of the 2012 Life Safety Code that were recommended by culture change proponents. Interested nursing homes must request a waiver of the currently-adopted code in order to implement the changes. The changes include:

- Increasing the amount of wall space that may be covered by combustible decorations
- Permitting gas fireplaces in common areas
- Permitting permanent seating groupings of furniture in corridors
- Allowing kitchens serving less than 30 residents to be open to corridors as long as they are contained within smoke compartments.

Due to the complex nature of some of the requirements related to these provisions, each waiver request will be evaluated separately by CMS and the state survey agency, with final approval by the CMS Regional Office. The state and CMS are working on developing the process under which waiver requests will be considered. We will keep you posted as more information becomes available.

# New Food Sanitation Rules effective July 1

Oregon is updating its Food Sanitation Rules to align with the 2009 FDA Food Code (current rules are based on the 1999 FDA Food Code). Among the changes:

- Cut tomatoes and leafy greens will be considered a potentially hazardous food and once cut, (i.e., in salsas, salads, etc.) must be temperature controlled;
- Bare hand contact will be prohibited with ready-to-eat food. In addition to gloves, servers can use tongs, wax paper, other utensils, etc. to avoid bare hand contact.
- The temperature for hot holding will drop from 140 to 135 degrees.

# Kitchen-related citations increasing in ALFs and RCFs

During this month's Community-based Care (CBC) News Hour, it was noted that citations related to kitchen operations were increasing in ALFs and RCFs. Many facilities are being cited because staff are unable to answer questions about how they are making sure that dishwashers are operating properly, and at the temperatures specified in manufacturer's guidelines. Regular, documented temperature checks were recommended. Other common areas cited are:

- Food temperatures be sure temperatures are being taken and documented
- General kitchen cleaning be sure you have a plan for daily cleaning, deep cleaning, etc., and that the plan is being followed.

# Oregon Housing agency gets second chance at HUD contract

Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS) gets a second chance at HUD's Project Based Contract Administration (PBCA) contract in Oregon with the re-opening this month of the bidding process. HUD is re-bidding the contracts after Oregon and 41 other states protested the previous bidding process, when a Bremerton, Washington-based agency was awarded the contract for Oregon. Among the significant changes in the newly-released Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA):

- In-state applicants will have a distinct advantage over potential out-of-state applicants
- Management reviews will no longer be required annually
- Reduction in the cap on allowable administrative fees to 2 percent, with more points scored for applicants who will do the work for less

Contract announcements are expected August 31, with the effective date of new contracts Dec. 1. OHCS is currently acting as HUD's contract administrator in Oregon under a modified contract that was recently renewed. Read more about the rebid process.

#### State puts spotlight on Memory Care residents without dementia diagnosis

Residential Care Facilities that are endorsed as Memory Care Communities must request a standard Medicaid contract if they have spouses living in the community who do not have a diagnosis of progressive dementia. The state's Community-based Care team issued a recent Administrator Alert on this topic when it became aware of residents, primarily spouses of other residents, living in Memory Care Communities without a dementia diagnosis. In cases where the spouse is a Medicaid client, facilities were being paid the supplemented memory care rate for that individual.

Effective immediately, CBC policy analysts will review exception requests more thoroughly. In cases where the spouse is on Medicaid and does not have a dementia diagnosis, the community will be able to accept the spouse only if they have a standard RCF contract. Exception requests are still required for spouses that do not have a dementia diagnosis, regardless of payment source. Read the Alert.

# 30-day Move-out Notice timeline for ALFs and RCFs clarified

Assisted living and residential care providers continue to err when counting days for 30-day Move-out Notices, according to the Community-based Care program team. Program Analyst Becky Mapes

clarified on the recent CBC News Hour that providers must begin counting the 30 days the day <u>after</u> a Move-out Notice is issued. She also noted that prior to issuing a less-than-30-day Move-out Notice, providers need to contact their assigned policy analyst to discuss strategies and alternatives.

# Antipsychotic use in nursing homes focus of new initiative

Surveyors will be scrutinizing the use of antipsychotic drugs in nursing homes under a new initiative launched by CMS this week. # LeadingAge lands grant to study affordable housing

The LeadingAge Center for Applied Research has received a \$698,000 grant from the MacArthur Foundation to assess the effectiveness of affordable housing settings for meeting the long-term care needs of low-income older adults. With the grant, the Center will study the role that publicly-assisted, service-enriched housing for older adults can play in helping residents "age in place." The researchers will also assess whether linking services with congregate housing settings makes a difference in residents' use of health services. This is highly relevant research in a time when states and the nation are searching for ways to control health care costs. Kudos to Robyn Stone and her research team on this great news!
