Oregon Health Authority certifies first 11 CCOs

The Oregon Health Authority has provisionally certified 11 Coordinated Care Organization (CCO) applicants. Four of the organizations that applied were asked to resubmit their applications for specified service areas. The service areas covered by these 11 initial CCOs include all Oregon counties <u>except</u> Clatsop, Columbia, Gilliam, Hood River, Morrow, Tillamook, Umatilla and Yamhill. Applications covering those additional counties/service areas will be reviewed in the coming months. Two CCOs were provisionally certified for the Portland metro area: the Tri-County Medicaid Collaborative and FamilyCare, Inc. View the list of certified CCOs on the <u>CCO Oregon website</u>. The 11 certified applicants will move forward to contract negotiations and will undergo a review to ensure that they meet the core certification criteria and CMS approval. Effective dates for each of these first CCOs are expected to be available at the end of June.

LeadingAge Oregon will be holding the next Coordinated Care Organization/Health Care Reform planning meeting from **10 a.m. to Noon on Tuesday**, **June 12** at the LeadingAge Oregon office to continue a discussion of what we might do collectively to position ourselves within Oregon's transforming health care system. Nursing Facility Provider Tax calculated for 2013

Adults and People with Disabilities (APD) has calculated the nursing facility provider tax for 2013 to be \$18.35 per resident bed day, representing an increase of 4.8% from the 2012 rate of \$17.51. We have posted on the LeadingAge website the state's <u>Provider Tax Briefing</u> as well as the names of the CCRCs and the fourteen nursing homes with a Medicaid occupancy greater than 85% that are <u>exempt</u> from the tax. Per state statute, the provider tax is due to expire in July 2014, making it an issue again for the upcoming legislative session.

Revenue Forecast reveals \$17.9 million decrease

On May 22, the Office of Economic Analysis released the <u>June Revenue Forecast</u> to the House and Senate Interim Committees on Revenue, revealing a projected decrease in revenue and lottery funds of \$17.9 million for the remainder of the 2011-13 biennium. The state economist noted that while the state budget is growing and can be expected to do so in the future, it is doing so at a slower pace than in past economic recoveries. As a result of the forecast, the state will not be making any additional budget cuts at this time.

In-Home Care Survey Citation Report released

With the final rules still pending, health care licensure and certification released a report of the <u>most</u> <u>frequent survey citations</u> for the period of January 1, 2011 through May 21, 2012. Nursing home surveyors hope reminders will speed up survey process

QIS Survey Coordinator Sarah Hout has sent out a memo to Oregon nursing homes with reminders that she hopes will speed up the QIS survey process, which is taking longer than the traditional survey process. Nursing homes are asked to make sure they can provide surveyors with unrestricted access to electronic medical records; provide a current and accurate alphabetized census as soon as possible when surveyors enter the building; and to quickly provide a New Admission List to include residents admitted 30 days prior to the date of the survey entrance and are still residing in the facility. <u>Read the QIS survey memo.</u>

New Food Sanitation rules take effect July 1

Oregon's Food Sanitation Rules are being updated to the 2009 FDA Food Code as of July 1. Oregon's nursing facility and ALF/RCF rules both require that facilities comply with the food sanitation rules. According to Dave Martin of the Oregon Health Authority, there has been some pushback to the new prohibition on bare hand contact with ready-to-eat food, so there is an outside possibility that the bare hand provision may not be included in the final rules. We will notify members if that is the case. In the meantime, fact sheets on each of the significant rule changes are available on the <u>state Food Code</u> webpage.

More ALFs/RCFS being cited for staff training

According to CCMU survey records, more assisted living and residential care facilities are being cited for 370 - Staffing Requirements and Training. Please remember that due to a CMS mandate, surveyors are now reviewing training records at all ALF/RCF surveys. Civil money penalty address change

Nursing homes expect layoffs as the result of rate reductions

A recent survey of nursing homes indicates that many plan to lay off staff and cancel the addition of new positions as the result of the 11.1 percent Medicare rate cut imposed by CMS in August 2011. According to the survey by Avalere Health, the rate reduction could result in at least 20,000 layoffs industry-wide and the cancellation of approximately 400 nursing facility expansions or renovations. CCRCs need to get into the post-acute care market or risk being left behind in the world of healthcare reform, according to a column by Bill Pomeranz of Cain Brothers. CMS announces partnership to improve dementia care

CMS this week announced the Partnership to Improve Dementia Care, an initiative with the primary goal of ensuring appropriate care and use of antipsychotic medications for nursing home residents. The partnership has set a national goal of reducing the use of antipsychotic drugs in nursing homes by 15 percent by the end of 2012. CMS has taken the following steps toward achieving this goal:

- The agency has developed Hand in Hand, a training series for nursing homes that emphasizes person-centered care and prevention of abuse.
- Data on each nursing home's antipsychotic drug use will be posted on Nursing Home Compare starting in July.
- CMS is emphasizing non-pharmacological alternatives for nursing home residents, including consistent staff assignments, increased exercise or time outdoors, monitoring and managing acute and chronic pain, and planning individualized activities.

HUD moves ahead with capping budget-based rent adjustments

Despite protests from LeadingAge and other organizations, HUD has moved forward with capping Option 4 budget based rent adjustments by a rent comparability study. OCAF adjustments for Option 4 contracts will continue to be available without a rent comparability study. More information about this and other HUD changes will be forthcoming from LeadingAge.
