Joint Legislative Committee on Coronavirus Response Update

The Joint Legislative Committee on Coronavirus Response has met four times for a total of 18 hours over the past week. The Committee has focused on the immediate needs of Oregonians: Stability for Individuals and Families (90-day plan); Health Care System Needs; and Short-Term Employer Support.

Based on the information shared in the Hearings and input from other legislators the Committee initially drafted a list of 47 potential <u>issues and/or recommendations</u> to be

considered. The Committee Co-Chairs (Sen. Roblan and Rep. Holvey) and the ranking minority members on the committee (Sen. Boquist and Rep. Stark) are drafting statutory, policy and budget recommendations for the full committee to consider presenting to the Legislature. It is anticipated the Co-Chair's proposal will be available this week.

The Co-Chairs have emphasized the proposals are designed to help Oregonians get through the next 90 days and longer-term recommendations will need to be identified by the committee as their work continues. In the end the work of the committee, the Legislature and the Governor's office will be adjusted to maximize the impact of the Federal Government actions.

State Officials Release Oregon's Project COVID-19 Cases Under Difference Scenarios
The latest models state health officials released today forecast the following outcomes of
COVID-19 infections for 3 different scenarios:

- **Return to business as usual:** If Oregon lifted all the social distancing measures state leaders have instituted in recent weeks, there will be an estimated 15,000 cumulative infections by May 8th (within a range of 5,900-26,000). Approximately 1,100 people would need inpatient beds (850 AAC/250 ICU) across Oregon.
- Maintain bans on large gatherings and indefinite school closures: There would be an
 estimated 6,100 cumulative infections by May 8th (within a range of 2,000-12,000) and
 340 people will need inpatient beds (260 AAC/80 ICU).
- Maintain aggressive interventions put into place on Monday, March 23rd (i.e.., Stay Home, Save Lives) with high public adherence: There will be an estimated 1,000 (within a possible range of 700-3,800) cumulative infections by May 8th. Under this scenario, hospitals would have to boost capacity by a smaller number of beds.

PPE Benchmark Tool

The CDC released a <u>Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Burn Rate Calculator [cdc.gov]</u> yesterday. You are encouraged to start using the calculator to gauge your PPE use compared against the benchmark or expected burn rate. The website tells you about the spreadsheet with specific instructions listed as well. Given the extremely limited supply of PPE, all healthcare providers need to understand where they may have opportunities to conserve and optimize PPE use. If you aren't currently using large amounts of PPE, you are still encouraged to track your PPE supply using this spreadsheet. *And, if your PPE supply isn't currently secured/locked, limiting the number of staff having access to it, please take those steps now.* (This is being said due to the experience of providers who supplies have been stolen.)
